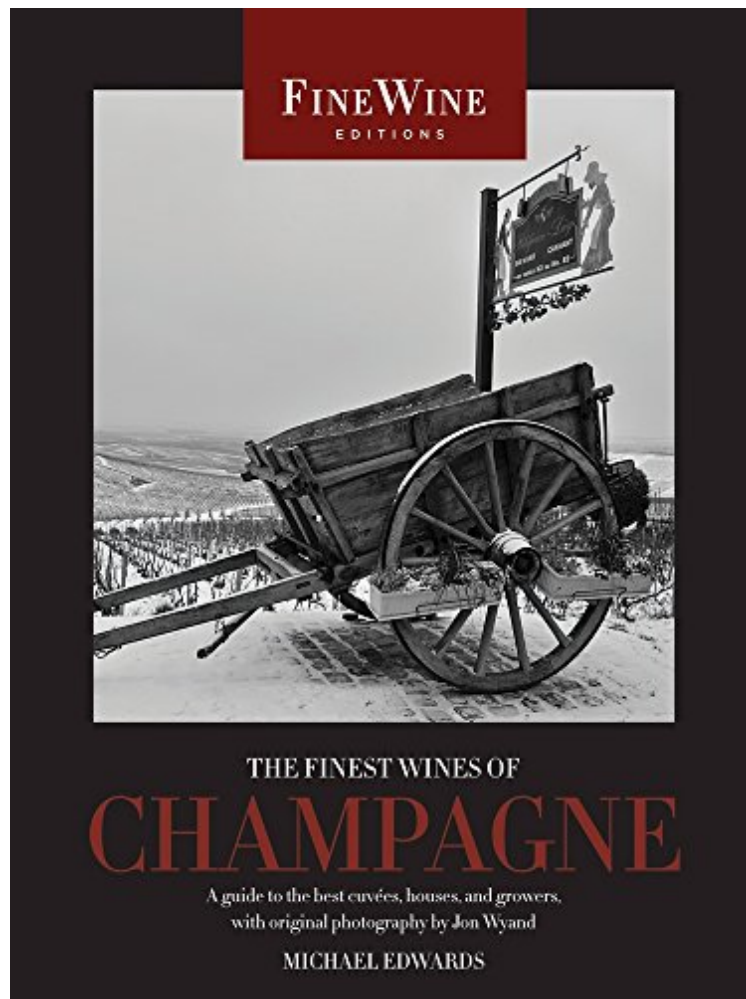

Edward's "The Finest Wines of Champagne..." is one of those books that gives a nice recent introduction of the families that run the houses that produce champagne. There are big and small producers presented in the book but the producers highlighted are the subset you are likely to see product from on the wine store shelf in the US. Each of the producer profiles are succinct and informative. The short intro upfront in the book is an adequate toe in the Champagne water.
